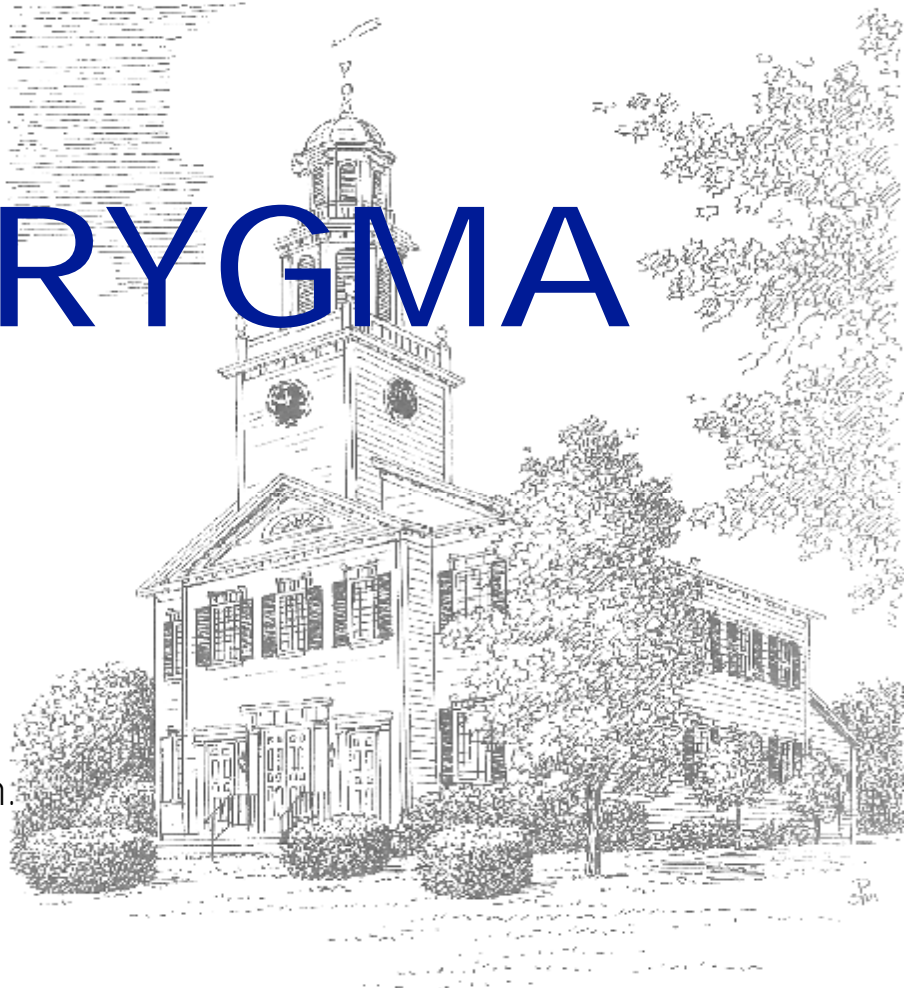

*Every new beginning comes from  
some other beginning's end.*

As I sit here at my desk, a fresh sprinkling of snow has covered my back yard. No longer can I see the leaves that didn't quite get raked up at the end of fall. No longer can I see the holes my daughter's dog dug in my newly planted hostas. No longer can I see where I started but didn't finish painting the picket fence. It all looks gloriously pristine. So it is with great joy that I receive the snow blanketing my yard. I am looking forward to discovering all that you appreciate about the Congregational Church in Killingworth, UCC. And with a deep respect for the layers of history covered with anticipation of a fresh start, I will stand before you in the pulpit on January 18 full of curiosity to see where God will lead us and where our footprints will take us together.

My job was to prepare the way, to the best of my ability, with the help of God, for the coming settled pastor and the congregation to establish and enjoy good relationship.



God's peace and blessing to you all. You have everything you need!

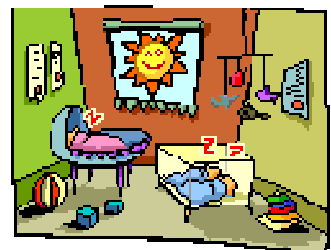

# Sunday School Corner

The Christmas season ends with the three wise men bringing gold, frankincense (an aromatic resin used in perfume) and myrrh (dried sap of the Commiphora myrrha tree) to baby Jesus. These items were precious and considered fit for a king. We are all blessed with many gifts and talents. We try to make the Sunday School children aware of the fact that they too are blessed with many gifts and talents. Especially when we do some of our mission projects. A big thanks to all the many talented children who sang during the season of Advent. They probably were not aware of how much pleasure many of the adults experienced watching these young folk perform.

We were recently sent a thank you note from Church World Service thanking us for the school kits we put together in September. CWS was able to send to the Dominican Republic 22,635 Hygiene Kits, 9,750 School Kits, 1,500 Baby Kits and 2,500 Blankets. We would like to continue our mission work by collecting items in the month of February in order to put together hygiene kits.

The first Sunday in January we will have a multiage program finishing off "The Jesse Tree" workshop rotation. Our new workshop rotation entitled "Mary of Bethany Anoints Jesus" will begin the second Sunday in January. Through a science workshop, a game workshop and a music workshop, the children will learn several things. They will hear how Mary of Bethany anointed Jesus to show her love for him; they'll learn about foot washing, anointing and burial preparation among the Jewish people in Jesus' day and they will consider ways they can care for others. Pre-K, Kindergarten, seventh and eighth graders will continue using the "Gather Round" curriculum.

Hopefully you enjoyed the CE Advent Brunch and the children's singing during December. Mark your calendar for the CE pancake supper on Fat Tuesday, February 24th. We will have a Mardi Gras theme and your child will be able to decorate a mask to take home. One last chance to have some fun before the season of Lent begins.

KERYGMA – to cry or proclaim as a herald, preaching good news to the poor, the blind, the captive: Jesus began his public ministry in the synagogue of his hometown, Nazareth in Galilee. He was handed the scroll of the prophet Isaiah and

read: *"The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he has anointed me to bring good news to the poor. He has sent me to proclaim release to the captives and recovery of sight to the blind, to let the oppressed go free, to proclaim the year of the Lord's favor."* Jesus rolled up the scroll and sat down. With all eyes in the synagogue upon him he said, "Today this scripture has been fulfilled in your hearing" - (Luke 4:16-21).

"**Auld Lang Syne**" is a Scottish poem written by Robert Burns in 1788 and set to the tune of a traditional folk song (Roud # 6294). It is well-known in many English-speaking countries, and it is often sung to celebrate the start of the new year at the stroke of midnight on New Year's Day.

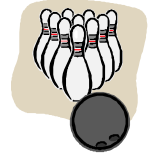
The song's (Scots) title may be translated into English literally as "old long since", or more idiomatically, "long long ago"<sup>[1]</sup> or "days gone by". The phrase "Auld Lang Syne" is also used in similar poems by Robert Ayton (1570–1638), Allan Ramsay (1686-1757) and James Watson (1711) as well as older folk songs predating Burns.<sup>[2]</sup> In his retelling of fairy tales in the Scots language, Matthew Fitt uses the phrase "In the days of auld lang syne" as the equivalent of "Once upon a time." In Scots **syne** is pronounced like the English word *sign* — IPA: [sain] — not [zain] as many people pronounce it. The last line of the chorus is frequently mis-sung by crowds and untrained groups as "for the sake of Auld Lang Syne". This is partly because the words themselves are not understood, but also because it has become common practice. It is rarely, if ever, incorrectly performed by trained choirs.

## Stewardship 2009 – A Matching Challenge
