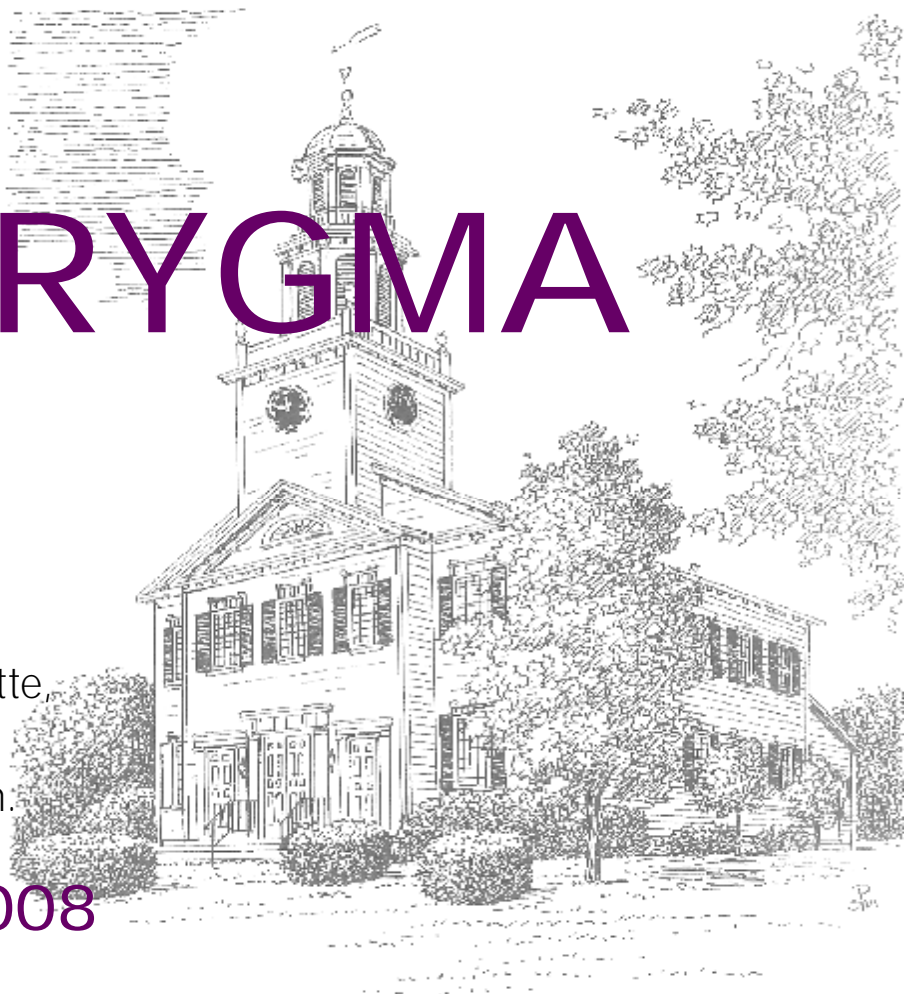

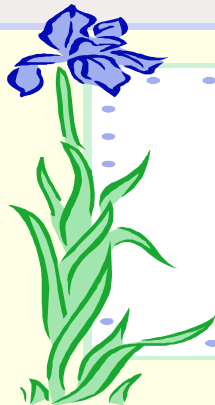

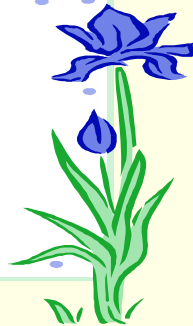

As I write this in early May, the economy is major news. Gas prices are the highest they have ever been and a gallon of milk costs almost twice a gallon of gas. I don't need to recite it all here, and besides, the volatility of the economy is such that it will all have changed by the time you read this.

When reflecting on economics, I like to recall a mini-study I did while in seminary. I decided to go through Luke's gospel and do a simple count

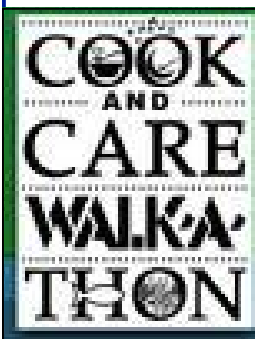

of how many times Jesus taught about money and how many times he taught about sex (the hot topic back then.) I discovered that even taking the most liberal interpretation of sexuality (simple physical touch), money and economics far outpaced sex in His teaching, by more than two to one, if I recall correctly. Yet the Christian church has been woefully inadequate in teaching about ethics and money, generosity, wealth, and legacy. About once a year, like it or not, the minister will preach a stewardship sermon. And we have come to associate stewardship almost solely with raising the operating budget, despite our lip service to time, talent and treasure. We act as though both wealth and poverty are sinful – wealth because someone must have done something underhanded to gain it, and poverty because someone must have done something awful to deserve it. I've addressed poverty before in this column, but never riches. Wealth is a tremendous opportunity for Christian service. Most of those I know who are persons of great economic privilege think deeply about that opportunity, want to make

a difference in our world, and are yearning for meaningful conversation and Christian teaching about the use of their resources. Yet for some reason we clergy are reluctant to broach the issue with them, believing that we are not supposed to notice. As a result, those deep conversations happen apart from the church and without pastoral guidance.

Let me tell you a story. At one time, Augustus Field Beard, son of First Church in Norwalk, was serving as minister of the American Church in Paris, when young Leland Stanford died while studying abroad. Senator Stanford and his wife grieved deeply the loss of their son and sought his counsel spiritually. Their visits turned, at the initiative of Sen. Stanford, to the difference his wealth might make in memory of his son. From those conversations grew the great legacy of Stanford University.

Today there are more persons of wealth than there have ever been in this state. They are largely good and faithful people who know both the joy of affluence and its responsibilities. They yearn to make a difference and we would do well to invite them into dialogue. It is a spiritual matter of profound significance in their lives. So...the planning committee for the Fall Annual Meeting (October 17-18 at Central High School in Bridgeport) has decided to focus on generosity, philanthropy and legacy – not just for those of wealth, but for all of us. Our keynoter will be Rev. Steve Gray, Conference Minister of Indiana-Kentucky Conference who has a great passion about this subject, and we will focus break out sessions on everything from new forms of stewardship campaigns, to planned giving ministries, to Bible study on wealth, capital campaigns, greening our churches as good stewardship... It will break us through, we hope, to some new understandings of financial development in this era of our nation's life – for the sake of both the world and the church. It will be very exciting and a great opportunity for the financial and stewardship leaders of our churches, for individuals of means, for pastors and for delegates. I look forward to seeing you there.

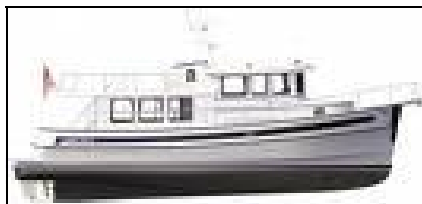
